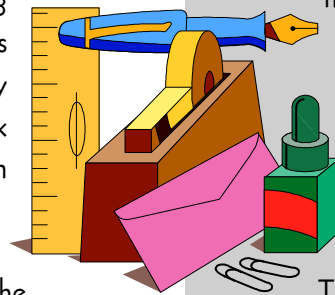
A lesson in Morality
