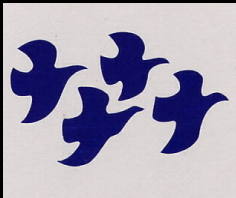

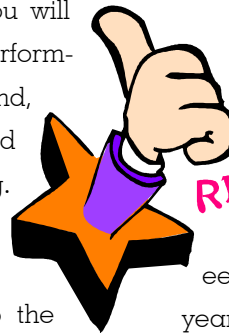
Featuring this week on Nunavimuit: Riddu Riddu, Part 1

Tune in to Nunavimuit on APTN this week to watch Part one of Riddu Riddu.

Part one of an amazing series covering the Riddu Riddu music festival in Norway. Watch and be amazed as aboriginals from as far away as Botswana and as close as your neighbours, congregate in the tiny town of Manndalen, with a population of only 900. You will see and hear musical performers from Tuva, New Zealand, New Guinea, Salqalin and this in only the beginning. From throat singing to traditional dance, from the drums of New Guinea to the feet stomping of Botswana, these performers all have a story to tell. Traditions we think of as our own and unique but upon meeting other aboriginal people, we discover similarities in many of the same things. From the bells on the jingle dances to the seed pods of the Botswana dancers to the way food is prepared, we are

so far apart but so close at the same time. Watch, enjoy and become mesmerized. You will be begging to see and hear more.

You could watch Nunavimuit every Tuesday at 10:00 am, 3:00 PM and 6:30 PM. You could also catch a re-run of every Tuesday's episode on Thursdays of the same week, at 8:00 PM.

A JOKE FOR THE WEEK

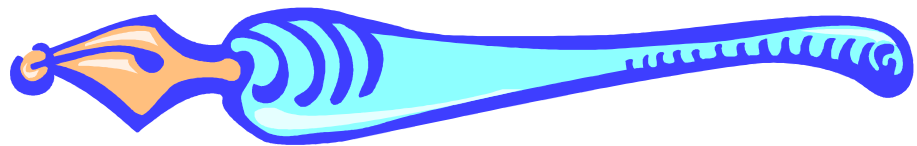
